After & Before Luxleaks

- 2007/2008: Financial Crisis
 - ➤ Bailout of banks & economic downturn
 - ➤ Need to go after the missing billions

- Luxleaks scandal in Nov 2014
 - >Luxembourg as a tax haven
 - ➤ Over 300 companies including
 - > Apple, Amazon, Pepsi, Ikea or Deutsche Bank
 - ➤ Game changer for the newly elected European Commission headed by Juncker



European Parliament puts pressure...

Luxleaks (November 2014)	2 special committees against tax rulings (February 2015 – July 2016)
Panama Papers (April 2016)	Inquiry committee against money laundering, tax evasion and tax avoidance (June 2016 – December 2017)
Paradise Papers (November 2017)	Special Committee against money laundering, tax evasion and tax avoidance (March 2018 – March 2019)

Permanent sub-committee on tax for the period 2019-2024


Progress made...

- Automatic exchange of tax information between Member States
 - > catching individuals hiding money offshore

- Cloosing tax loopholes used by some large companies
 - > limiting as much as possible tax avoidance by companies

European blacklist of tax havens

> finally listing Panama and Cayman Islands (but no EU countries)

Taxing the digital economy

- ➤ Response to Google, Apple, Facebook, Amazon and other giants not paying taxes where they have customers
- ➤ Work in progress at the international level (over 130 countries negotiating) with a deadline until November 2020 to find an agreement

Progress made...



- > Know who really owns companies and trusts
- > Additional checks for politically exposed persons
- > Blacklisting third countries presenting high risks
- ➤ Increased cooperation between Member States
- ➤ Protection of whistleblowers



... but more needs to be done

- We need tax transparency about where large companies pay taxes
 - Ongoing reform but blocked by Member States (Germany is abstaining)
- We need a common way of taxing companies at the EU level
 - Ongoing discussions but blocked by Member States (especially Ireland, Luxembourg, Malta or Cyprus)
- We need a minimum tax rate for companies in the EU
 - Greens call for 20%
- We need to address the new forms of tax evasion/avoidance (e.g. golden visas, patent boxes, interest deduction, hiding behind strawmen etc...)
